Congo Ebola risk raised

World Health Organisation on Friday said the Ebola outbreak in Congo is spreading rapidly and now poses a "very high" risk in the country, amid a shortage of medical resources and growing anger among residents in the conflict-ridden region. WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said the risk of global spread remains low, 82 cases and seven deaths have been confirmed, while 750 cases and 177 deaths are suspected. Aid and medical supplies are being rushed to Luri as frontline staff struggle with limited resources and resistance linked to misinformation and local burial customs.

Indian Army displays skills

An Indian Armed Forces delegation led by Lieutenant General Pushpendra Pal Singh attended SOF Week 2026 in Tampa, Florida, from May 18 to 21. In a first, the Indian Army participated in the CAPEX capability demonstration, showcasing Special Forces expertise in counter-terrorism, unconventional warfare, high-altitude combat and jungle warfare. The event highlighted expanding India-US defence ties and international Special Operations collaboration.

Founded in 2008, AstaGuru plans private viewings and seminars in London to attract collectors and investors to its art and luxury auctions.

Pak marks China ties

Pakistan will issue a special PKR75 commemorative coin to mark 75 years of diplomatic relations with China as both countries continue celebrations of their longstanding strategic partnership. Pakistan and China established formal ties in 1951, less than two years after the founding of the People's Republic of China. Pakistan was the first Muslim country to establish diplomatic relations with Beijing.

Slow Food founder dies

Carlo Petrini, founder of the Slow Food movement promoting sustainable food production and traditional cuisine, died Friday at age 76 in Italy's Piedmont region, the organisation announced. Founded in 1989, Slow Food expanded to more than 160 countries with the philosophy that food should be "good, clean and fair". Petrini founded the University of Gastronomic Sciences and the Terra Madre network.

There is slight progress in Iran talks, says Rubio

US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said on Friday there was "slight progress" during talks with Iran amid uncertainty whether a deal will be reached or war will resume. Rubio spoke ahead of a meeting of Nato foreign ministers in Helsingborg, Sweden, where the military alliance is expected to discuss what role it could play in helping police the Strait of Hormuz once the war is over.

Rubio said he did not want to exaggerate the progress, saying there had been "a little bit of movement and that's good." He said the conversations were ongoing. Still, in recent weeks there have been repeated claims of progress, yet a deal has not been reached.

Naqvi, Araghchi hold fresh talks

Islamabad: Pakistan's Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi met Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi in Tehran on Friday for the second time within 24 hours to review proposals aimed at ending the war between the US and Iran. Naqvi met Araghchi to review proposals for resolving disputes. They discussed detailed proposals to end the US-Iran conflict. Meanwhile, Pakistan's Chief of Staff Marshal Asim Munir arrived in Tehran to broker a peace deal between the US and Iran. —PTI

remained active, though uncertain. "The president's preference is always a deal. His preferences are always an agreement and always diplomacy." He cautioned against excessive optimism.

"We're going to do everything we can to see if we can get a deal," Rubio said. India also figured in Rubio's remarks as he addressed concerns over energy security and supply disruptions.

"We want to sell them as much energy as they'll buy," Rubio said, adding, "They're a great ally, a great partner; we do a lot of good work with them."

Rubio says Cuba poses threat to America; Havana says 'lies'

Cuba poses a "national security threat" to the US and the likelihood of a peaceful agreement is "not high," US Secretary of State Marco Rubio has said. His comments come just a day after the US charged Cuba's former president Raúl Castro with murder over the 1996 downing of two planes resulting in the killing of US nationals.

Rubio said Washington's preference was "a diplomatic solution" but warned Trump had the right and obligation to protect his country against any threat. Cuba's Foreign Minister Bruno Rodríguez accused Rubio of "lies" and said the island had never posed a threat to the US.

Speaking to reporters, Rubio said diplomacy "remains our preference with Cuba", but added, "the likelihood of that happening, given who we're dealing with right now, is not high." He accused Cuba

of being "one of the leading sponsors of terrorism in the region", which Rodríguez vehemently denied on X.

The Cuban foreign minister criticised Rubio for trying to "instigate a military aggression" and accused the US government of "ruthlessly and systematically" attacking his country. Cuba is suffering from a fuel crisis exacerbated by an effective US oil blockade, while under pressure from the Trump administration to make a deal. Its citizens have experienced extended blackouts and food shortages over the last few months.

Rubio said the country had accepted a US offer of \$100 million in humanitarian aid.

Whether and how his government would get Castro to the US to face the charges, Rubio replied: "I'm not going to talk about how we're going to get him here, if we were trying to get him here, why

Trump's Europe troop move baffles Nato allies

Helsingborg: Nato allies and defence officials expressed bewilderment on Friday at US President Trump's announcement he would send 5,000 US troops to Poland weeks after he ordered the same number of forces pulled out of Europe. The apparent change of mind came after weeks of statements from Trump and his administration about reducing, not increasing, the American military footprint in Europe.

Trump's initial order set off a flurry of action among military commanders and left allies already doubtful about America's commitment to Europe's security to ponder what forces they might have to backfill on Nato's eastern flank with Russia and Ukraine.

Earlier this month, the Trump administration said it was reducing levels in Europe by about 5,000 troops, and US officials confirmed about 4,000 service members were no longer deploying to Poland. The dispatch to Germany of US personnel trained to fire long-range missiles was also halted.

But on Truth Social on Thursday, Trump said he would send an additional

5,000 troops to Poland, citing his strong ties with Polish President Karol Nawrocki, whom Trump endorsed in elections last year. "It is confusing, and not always easy to navigate," Swedish Foreign Minister Maria Malmer Stennergard told reporters at a meeting on Friday that she was hosting of her Nato counterparts, including US Secretary of State Marco Rubio.

Ministers from the Netherlands and Norway were sanguine about Trump's latest move, as was Latvian Foreign Minister Baiba Braze, who said allies knew the US troop posture was being reconsidered, and now there is no change of posture for now.

US defence officials also expressed confusion. "We just spent the better part of two weeks reacting to the first announcement. We don't know what this means either," said one of two officials.

But Rubio played down the issue. He said the US continues to have global commitments that it needs to meet in terms of force deployment, and that constantly requires the administration to re-examine where it puts troops. —AP

'US depleted half of its THAAD interceptor stock to defend Israel'

Washington: The US has depleted nearly half of its total inventory of advanced missile-defence interceptors to defend Israel in the now-paused war with Iran, The Washington Post reported on Thursday. The US launched over 200 Terminal High Altitude Area Defence (THAAD) interceptors, alongside over 100 naval interceptors. However, Israel fired fewer than 100 Arrow interceptors and 90 Davids Sling interceptors.

Officials warned if hostilities resume, as President Trump has threatened, the interceptor imbalance will worsen because Israel has taken some batteries offline for maintenance. The Pentagon defended its resource allocation. "Ballistic missile interceptors are just one tool in a vast network of systems," said Pentagon chief spokesman Sean Parnell, adding both nations carried the defensive burden equitably during Op Epic Fury. The Israeli Embassy in Washington praised the coordination, saying operations were managed at highest levels to the benefit of countries and allies. —PTI

US hasn't notified Taipei of arms sale pause: Kuo

Taipei: Taiwan has not been notified of any pause in a planned \$14 billion US arms sale to the self-governing island, a government official said on Friday. It follows comments from acting US Navy Secretary Hung Cao to a Senate committee in Washington that some foreign military sales were being delayed to ensure the American military has enough munitions for the Iran war.

Days after Trump raised doubts about continuing arms sales to Taiwan, Cao said the sales would resume when the administration considers it appropriate. "Right now we're doing a pause to ensure we have the munitions we need for 'Epic Fury'," Cao told the US Senate Appropriations Defense Subcommittee, referring to the Trump gov't's name for the Iran operation.

"Then the foreign military sales will continue when the administration deems necessary," he said.

any. Taiwan's authorities have seen the reports, "but currently there is no information regarding any adjustments the US will make to this arms sale," Taiwanese presidential spokesperson Karen Kuo said.

The Trump administration authorised an \$11 billion weapons package for Taipei in Dec, but it has yet to move forward. American lawmakers also approved a separate \$14 billion arms sale to Taiwan in Jan, though the deal cannot proceed until Trump formally submits it to US Congress.

US OKS MODEST ARMS SALE FOR UKRAINE

Trump gov't has approved a modest \$108 million arms sale to Ukraine that will help the country maintain and sustain its midrange air defence missile system. US State Dept announced the sale of ground-to-air Hawk missile components, spare parts and logistic support late Thursday. —AP

London: British police appealed for witnesses on Friday as they widen their probe into potential offences by Andrew Mountbatten-Windsor, including sexual misconduct. Thames Valley Police issued the update regarding allegations of misconduct in public office by the former prince.

B'desh seeks exiled Hasina's legal return

Dhaka: Bangladesh Home Minister Salahuddin Ahmed has said the government wants former PM Sheikh Hasina to return through "legal procedures". The statement comes as a reaction to recent remarks that she hoped to return home "very soon" despite facing a death sentence.

"We want to get her back through legal procedures," Ahmed, a senior minister in PM Tarique Rahman's cabinet, told reporters.

Gunmen kill 25 in Honduras

Tegucigalpa: Gunmen opened fire in two separate coastal attacks in Honduras on Thursday, killing at least 25 people, authorities said.

Attackers shot dead at least 19 workers at a plantation in Trujillo, a region plagued by a long-standing agrarian conflict. In the second attack, assailants ambushed an anti-gang police mission near the Guatemala border in Omoa, killing six officers.

Security Ministry said the National Police and armed forces will deploy heavily to both regions, while specialised teams of forensic experts and prosecutors probe the massacres. —AP

H-1B visa regns drop 38.5% as US shifts focus to high earners

Washington: Registrations for H-1B visas fell by 38.5% in fiscal year 2027 with the US saying it had approved more applicants with advanced degrees and higher salaries of those "making a real impact on the economy." The decision by the US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) is likely to hit Indians the most, who made up an estimated 71% of all approved H-1B applications in recent years.

On X, the USCIS said only 17.7% of all selected registrations were in the lowest wage category. "The number of properly submitted registra-

tions plummeted by 38.5%, from 3,433,981 in fiscal year 2026 to just 2,116,000 in fiscal year 2027," the USCIS said.

Nearly three-fourths of the applications approved were of persons holding master's degrees or higher, it said.

"We're approving more applicants with advanced degrees and higher salaries — especially those who studied at US universities. An overwhelming 71.5% of selected aliens hold a US master's degree or higher, compared to 57% last year," it said.

It said these skilled workers are making a real impact on

the economy and the US was closing the door on the low-wage and low-skilled foreign labour pipeline approved under Biden administration policies. "This data is a clear sign the days of abusing the programme with mass, low-wage registrations are over, and the programme is better serving its intended purpose of attracting highly skilled foreign workers and protecting the wages, working conditions, and job opportunities of American workers," it said.

USCIS said Trump's policies of placing America First were displaying results. —PTI

US SANCTIONS TANZANIAN TOP COP OVER RIGHTS VIOLATIONS

Nairobi: The US has sanctioned Tanzania's police chief and barred him from entering the US, citing alleged human rights violations committed by the police force.

The sanctions announced on Thursday followed a general election in October in which President Samia Suluhu Hassan won a full term with 97% of the vote after a crackdown on opposition figures. US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said in December said the country was reviewing its ties with Tanzania over repression and election violence. —AP

Will Trump attend son's wedding?

Washington: US President Trump said he would try to attend the wedding ceremony of his eldest son Donald Trump Jr, but conceded the timing was difficult amid the Iran war and the wedding in West Asia. Donald Trump Jr, popularly known as Don Jr, is set to marry his fiancée Bettina Anderson on a small island in the Bahamas this weekend in what the president described as a private ceremony attended by close family members and friends. The POTUS said, "He'd like me to go. It's going to be just a small little private affair and I'm going to try and make it. This is not good timing for me. I have a thing called Iran and other things."

CBS airs Stephen Colbert's last show

Stephen Colbert hosted his final Late Show on Thursday night, transforming a rancorous network cancellation into a beautifully bizarre "cancellationbation". CBS had cancelled the highly popular late-night programme a year ago citing financial reasons, though fans suspected political motives linked to parent company Paramount's sale.

Colbert steered his final hour-plus with joyful defiance, outsmarting the sharpest vitriol to guests like Bruce



Springsteen. The veddy-teddy episode quickly evolved into a surreal narrative arc rather than a traditional talk show. The performance included cameos by Bryan Cranston, Paul Rudd and Ryan Reynolds. A running gag about booking the pope gave way to Colbert's actual final guest, pop icon Paul McCartney. The climax turned literal as Colbert faced a massive green

space-time vortex alongside his late-night peers Jon Stewart, John Oliver, Seth Meyers, Jimmy Fallon and Jimmy Kimmel. The sci-fi absurdity echoed his 2014 finale of The Colbert Report. The vortex eventually pulled Colbert into a musical purgatory where he performed with Elvis Costello and former bandleader Jon Batiste. He ultimately returned to the main stage to accompany McCartney on the Beatles classic Helo, Goodbye, signalling a bittersweet farewell to a mass-media staple.

NO TALENT, NO RATINGS, NO LIFE, COLBERT DEAD PERSON, SAYS TRUMP

Trump welcomed the conclusion of The Late Show and criticised Colbert. The show was reportedly scrapped after Colbert mocked the network over a \$16 million settlement with Trump related to allegations of "malicious editing" of an interview involving his Democratic election rival Kamala Harris. Trump has attacked Colbert and other mainstream late-night hosts, accusing them of bias and targeting him through their commentary.
